## Magician 'vanishing cash' to face jail?

A magician who worked in Harrods could be facing jail after allegedly vanishing cash from his cheese till.

Amit Gadhia, 35, was a kids' entertainer at the posh shop but was later moved to the food hall. Prosecutor Tom Gill told a court: "He was previously a magician in the store and used his talent to take money with one hand and secrete it with the other."

Gadhia, who worked at the London store for two-and-a-half years, said he stole because he was broke. He is believed to have taken around £70 in the run-up to Christmas. On searching, security



staff found a wrap of cocaine.

Catherine Newey, defending Gadhia, said: "He simply had no money to get the basics and was tempted by the opportunity."

Gadhia, pictured, who is divorced and has no children, admitted to police that he had taken between £1 and £20 on

different occasions in the lead-up to Christmas as reported by the Daily Mail. Catherine Newey, defending, said her client had run into financial difficulties after his parents' home was burgled and he contributed a 'significant amount' towards a security system. Ordering a probation report, Hammersmith JP Michael Cartwright reportedly warned: "All options are open, including custody."

Gadhia, of Enfield, North London, was due to be sentenced on Monday, after admitting theft by employee and possessing a class-A drug.

## Hitmen jailed for 40 years

Two hitmen who stabbed an innocent schoolboy to death by mistake have been told they deserve to die behind bars after a judge handed them a minimum term of 40 years.

Ben Hope, 39, and Jason Richards, 38, both from Cardiff, were each paid £1,000 in "blood money" to murder a middle-aged family man who owed money to a shady businessman. But the "hit" went horrifically wrong when the balaclava-clad killers, who were high on drugs, went to the wrong address in Roath, Cardiff, in April 2010 and murdered teenager Aamir Siddiqi by mistake. South Wales Police Detective Superintendent Paul Hurley described the murder as one of the worst he had seen in his 27-year career.

## Your local police teams scrapped by the London's mayor

These proposals are short-sighted and will fundamentally undermine the ability of local police service to keep us safe.
